So, where are you living now and what are you up to?

I'll have to go with the Ollie Leonard for getting us going all those years ago, and sticking with us even when we weren't the most successful on the pitch. And Seamus Ahern for sticking with us over the years, and being a huge part of our championship win.

Favourite team mate?

I'm going to pick a set of sisters, and there were many that I could put in here, but going to go with Lorna and Becca Fusiardi. Having them in the half back line in front of me always made me happy. We definitely weren't the tallest team in the league, especially when Mide and Caoimhe had moved away, but they didn't let too much come my way. It made my job a lot easier in the corner. Have you played or been involved in Gaelic games at all since leaving the club?

I left Eire Og to join the first Ladies football team in Ranelagh Gaels in 2010. At the time it was a club with no home (other than Smyths in Ranelagh!) and just one men's team. It's got a juvenile section now, but still no pitch of their own yet. We won the Junior E Championship in our very first year, and I played with them when I was around, until I left Dublin in 2016. I got involved in the committee as well there for a few years too. When I moved to London in 2017 I joined Dulwich Harps. When moving to a new place, what better way to meet some new people! We play on Peckham Rye Common and are the most central club in London. Anyone considering a move over to London are more than welcome to join us. I keep thinking I am going to retire but I togged out on Saturday for the first match of the season, still playing in corner back. I haven't hung up the boots just yet. I am the Club Treasurer now, though the funds are a lot less than what goes through the accounts back when I was doing the role in Eire Og.

Any possibility of returning to Greystones and maybe even wearing the jersey or getting involved in some capacity again?

I'm sure I'll get involved in some way if I am back living in Greystones. I enjoy being part of the GAA community and the value of it when you move to new places shouldn't be underestimated.
